Reg Roy Remembers

Reg Roy joined the Cape Breton Highlanders in 1939 as a Boy Soldier, He was subsequently promoted Sergeant and following officer training, rejoined the unit in Italy and served as a platoon commander throughout the remainder of the war. Following the war , Reg moved to B.C. What followed was an illustrious career in the academic and writing field. He taught at Royal Roads and the University of Victoria, has ten books and innumerable articles, book reviews, etc. to his credit. Reg has also lectured in Canada, the USA, South Africa and Australia. In 1988 he was appointed Honorary Lieutenant Colonel of the Communications Squadron in Victoria, BC. He has kindly offered to provide some of his memories of the early days leading up to the Cape Breton Highlanders embarking for Europe and Second World War.

News that war had been declared came to us from the radio station in Sydney. There was no letter or telephone call or anything like that. It did not come as a surprise. Ever since Hitler had gained power there seemed to be one crisis after another. He had marched into Alsace-Lorraine, he had ignored covertly the Versailles Treaty, he had taken over Austria and then Sudetenland in Czechoslovakia and now he had entered Poland.

I had joined the Cape Breton Highlanders with my brother in 1939 and had gone to summer camp in Charlottetown. I was in the signals platoon of Headquarters Company. The equipment we had was laughable. There was not one wheeled vehicle in the entire unit-not even a skate-board. There was not a single mortar. There were no modern machine-guns. We did have a few Lewis machine-guns left over from the Great War, but really there was no ammunition for them. That was all right, there was no rifle or machine-gun weapons range available.

There were no grenades, not even a mock grenade. There were no gas masks or respirators. We had World War I webbing. There was no battle dress. For that matter, there were no boots, socks, shirts, sweaters, etc. So what we wore was the kilt, tunic, WW I webbing, red and white over-socks (diced hose tops), sporran, Tam-O-Shanter, and a wide smile.
